SMOKE ALARMS: Which are best?

PHOTOELECTRIC

Photoelectric smoke alarms are generally more responsive to fires that begin with a long period of smoldering, or what is known as a "Smoldering Fire"

IONIZATION

lonization smoke alarms are generally more responsive to flaming fires. Knowing that there are 2 kinds of smoke detectors that are each better at detecting different fires, what should you have in your home?

BOTH! Why? Let's take a look below...

Why have two types of alarms?

Testing from multiple laboratories has shown that photoelectric and ionization detectors each have their strengths and weaknesses.

According to Consumer Reports, their tests of smoke detectors from multiple
manufacturers
found that
ionization
detectors were
great at testing a
fast, flaming fire
such as burning
paper but were
poor at detecting
slow, smoldering
fires such as a
couch or
mattress.

Oppositely,

Photoelectric alarms were good at detecting smoldering fires, but were poor at detecting flaming fires.

Do you or a family member have a physical disability, or of an age where mobility is an issue? If this is true, especially if you live alone, how could you call for help if you cannot get to a phone?

What if you fell or had an injury that made it impossible to call for help? You could be on the floor lying injured until someone came to find a medical alarm. Medical alarms come even if you are not in many types and models these days,

But most come in bracelet, pendant or necklace style. Most of the new models do not even require a home phone line because they operate like a cell phone. Some can even you...unless you have detect falls and are GPS capable, meaning that home, 911 dispatchers can track your location in an emergency.

Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless aas that is produced by the combustion of fuels. CO can cause illness, death or explode in high amounts. This can be because of improper venting of a fireplace, car, or by faulty gas appliances such as gas dryers, water heaters, furnaces, generators, etc.

The only way you can be alerted to the presence of CO in your home before dangerous levels cause symptoms is by having properly placed and working Carbon Monoxide Detectors in your home.

Carbon Monoxide Detectors should be placed on every level of your home and outside each

sleeping area.

- -Follow the manufacturer's specifications for mounting area and height as each detector may vary.
- -Be sure to purchase only detectors that have the label of a certified testing laboratory such as UL, FM, ANSI, etc. Contact us with any auestions.

Medication Disposal

Traces of medications and personal care products are now found in surface and ground waters. They enter our environment through several routes.

All medications whether taken orally or applied to the skin can be excreted or discharged into the sewage systems and ultimately reach surface or ground waters.

Another route for medications to find their way into our environment is through improper disposal.

The Macomb County Health Department and participating local pharmacies are accepting unwanted medications for safe and secure disposal.

The Problem:

Medications may become unwanted for a variety of reasons:

- Change in medications
- Change in dosage
- Non-use by patient
- Medication is outdated
- Patient has improved
- Patient has died

Unwanted medications are often stored in medicine cabinets until a disposal situation arises. Historically, medications were either:

- 1. Flushed down the toilet
- 2. Discarded into the garbage

Both of these options have disadvantages. Discarding medications into the household garbage can lead to consumption by children or pets. Medications flushed down the toilet may not be completely removed by the sewage treatment process and residual may end up in ground or surface waters.
